

WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

Africa

LIBERIA Refugee camps around the capital Monrovia are struggling to cope with thousands fleeing renewed clashes between the government and rebels which began last July. Up to 200,000 people died in civil war five years ago; pray that similar conflict may be averted.

SUDAN The Sudan Ecumenical Forum is organising a Special Service for Peace, Justice and Reconciliation this month at St George's Cathedral, Southwark, supported by aid agencies including Tearfund. Pray for all working for peace including a number of Tearfund partners.

ZIMBABWE The world is watching as, after 22 years in power, President Mugabe faces elections this month. Pray that they will be administered justly and that all fear and oppression will finally end.

D.R. CONGO The eruption of Mount Nyiragongo in January left 100,000 displaced in and around Goma town. As part of its response, Tearfund is helping re-equip health centres which were partially destroyed. Pray for Tearfund partners, including DOCS (Doctors On Call for Service), who are assisting people trying to recover from this devastating event.

Europe/The Middle East

MACEDONIA The government has asked 1,000 NATO peacekeepers to stay on beyond the end of their mandate on 26 March. Pray that the fragile peace between government forces and rebel ethnic Albanians can be strengthened, and for aid agencies including Tearfund partners AGAPE and Ithus Remedium Clinic.

ISRAEL/PALESTINE The violence in the Middle East, which has claimed more than 1,000 lives since the Palestinian intifada (uprising) began 18 months ago, shows no sign of abating response. Continue to pray for a breakthrough, and for an end to the 'tit for tat' violence which is wearing down both nations.

Latin America

BRAZIL The government has agreed on a package of austerity measures including spending cuts after Brazilian share prices fell by 30 per cent last month. Pray for those worst affected and for the growing level of violence in Brazilian cities to be cut - Tearfund partner Associacao Noemi are directly involved in prison ministry.

BOLIVIA Social unrest is rocking the nation; government policy now prohibits the authorised sale of coca leaves in some traditionally agreed markets. Violent confrontations between farmers and the armed forces have resulted in numerous deaths. Please pray for fair, wise and rapid solutions that support the livelihoods of the poorest.

News from Franklin Graham, son of Billy Graham

Franklin Graham, the President of Samaritan's Purse, has announced that over 5,200,000 filled shoe boxes were donated for the Operation Christmas Child Appeal in 2001. People from Europe, Australia and across North America contributed to this record-setting amount. The figure of 5.2 million is one million more that was collected in 2000. Operation Christmas Child is the world's largest children's Christmas project. The gift boxes were distributed to children in more than 90 countries including the Moslem nations of Afghanistan, Uzbekistan and Tajikistan. For some children these were their first ever Christmas gifts. Thank you to all at Deane who contributed to this most successful international project.

The Churchyard: Tom Stokes writes:

"On behalf of the congregation, I wish to thank Mr W Calderbank for his dedicated work in keeping the lawn near to the church porch so neat and for various other tasks around the church building and churchyard over several years.

"You may have noticed that the azaleas near to the church path have been cut back severely. This was done by Bolton Corporation who now mow the closed part of the churchyard. These azaleas were given in 1952 by Mr T Clarke, who was then the Head of Bolton Parks, and were originally in eight pots which were used as decorations for the Deane Church Quincentenary celebrations in 1952. They were later transferred to the two beds near the church door. They have never been pruned before. I hope sincerely that they will revive, but it will be a long time before they produce the lovely display of flowers which has welcomed us each spring for the past 49 years.

"The roses have been pruned and given a feed of Growmore fertiliser. We must watch out for Blackspot and Mildew in April and May, and spray stems and leaves with fungicide. Then we need to look out for green and black fly on the rose buds and spray them with insecticide."
