A Postscript to Wimbledon and the World Cup

Wimbledon

Another year has come and gone without a British victory at Wimbledon. But even if Tim Henman and Greg Rusedski enjoy success in the next few years, it is highly unlikely that what happened in 1879 and 1880 will ever be repeated. In those years the Men's Singles at Wimbledon was won two years running by John Hartley who was not only an Englishman, but also a full time clergyman in the Church of England!! The Rev John Thorneycroft Hartley was the Vicar of the North Yorkshire village of Burneston. So little did he expect to win in 1879 that he made no provision for his Sunday services. After the semi final he had to go back to Yorkshire for the weekend before returning for the final on the Monday. He took the Sunday morning and evening services, but then learnt that one of his parishioners was gravely ill and was not expected to survive the night. John Hartley sat up all night with the patient who died in the early hours of Monday morning. He then returned to his vicarage, collected his sandwiches, mounted his horse and rode to Thirsk station to catch the London train. At King's Cross he hailed a horse-drawn cab to take him to Waterloo for a train to Wimbledon. He managed to change into his tennis kit in the cab! He arrived just in time to play his match against Vere St Leger Goold and beat him by 3 sets to 0. One assumes he arranged cover for his services the following year!

John Hartley continued as Vicar of Burneston until his retirement in 1919. There are still people who remember him in Burneston. He lived to the age of 86 and died in 1935.

The most recent Wimbledon champion to be ordained was Margaret Court (nee Smith) of Australia who won the Ladies Championship in 1963, 1965 and 1970. She was ordained in 1991.

The World Cup



Yet again football fans are regretting another World Cup without an England victory, although we can have some consolation that England lost to the eventual winners, Brazil. But did you know that the Deane Church family can claim a link with the early days of football in Brazil? Olive Plant's father, Ernest Bowers, went out to Brazil as a young man in early 1914. He was an engraver to calico printers and went to Brazil from his home in Salford to work in a cotton mill in Paracambi, a village about 40 miles from Rio de Janeiro. Although football was played in the capital at that time, it was unknown up country. However the village boys were keen to learn and so Olive's father and three other young English men who worked at the mill began to teach them. They formed one team each. Olive still has a photograph of her father with his Brazilian team. It would be fascinating to know whether any of the present Brazil team has any connection with those boys of Paracambi almost ninety years ago!

WORLD WATCH *Prayer Link*

Latin America

ARGENTINA The country is increasingly descending into anarchy, with a ruined economy and increasingly desperate social problems. A recent survey showed few churches ready and willing to meet this challenge: pray for Tearfund partners El Retoño, SACDEM, Kairos, Ediciones Certeza and ASOCIANA, all needing prayer to help turn the tide.

PERU Tearfund partner Peace and Hope continues to support victims of terrorism and political violence. As well as helping those who have been wrongly imprisoned, they assist women who have suffered from domestic violence and help resolve disputes between indigenous populations and new settlers. Pray they can help make the new Truth and Reconciliation Commission really effective.

Africa

MADAGASCAR New president Marc Ravalomanana is being pressed to form a more inclusive government to end recent political turmoil and violence. New elections may follow soon; pray for smooth transitional government, and for Tearfund partners the Association of Bible Baptist Churches of Madagascar (FFBBM), and Scripture Union Aid for AIDS programme.

SUDAN Talks between the government and southern rebels were due to resume in June - a window for peace remains open in the continued ceasefire in the Nuba Mountains. Pray for a breakthrough, and especially for those being assisted by Tearfund and its partners.

D.R. CONGO The United Nations Security Council has extended its military observer mission for one year; security fears continue to affect the rebel-held east. As war crimes charges are levelled against Rwanda and its rebel allies for genocide and human rights abuses, pray for Tearfund partners working for justice and reconciliation.

ZIMBABWE Increased famine threatens the nation; some argue that world leaders could do more to encourage President Mugabe to open negotiations with the opposition MDC. Pray that further restrictions will not be imposed to prevent peaceful dissent; and for several Tearfund partners working to relieve suffering.

Central Asia/The Middle East

AFGHANISTAN Hamid Karzai, the country's new leader, has pledged to bring peace and security to his people. Pray against further attacks on aid workers in the north that may suspend programmes.

ISRAEL/PALESTINE As Israel builds a controversial new security fence to prevent Palestinian militants crossing into its territory, pray for all efforts to reduce tension and work for peace.

Asia

PAKISTAN Despite reduced tension with India, a suicide bomb attack on the US consulate in Karachi has increased security fears once more. Pray for all the bereaved in this continuing dispute; and for the safety of expatriates, including Tearfund staff.

NEPAL The increasingly violent six-year Maoist guerrilla struggle continues. Nearly 3,000 people have been killed since November when the government imposed a state of emergency and unleashed the army; pray that Tearfund partners will remain effective.

Date for your Diary

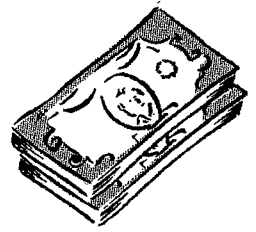
Don't forget to keep the evening of Wednesday 18th September free for the Induction of the new Rector, Rev Ian Mainey. The service begins at 7.30pm.

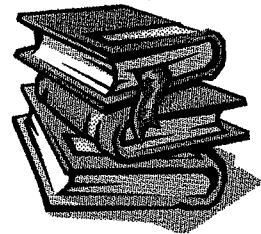

Holiday Reading!



The Editor recommends:-

Desecration by Tim LaHaye and Jerry B Jenkins

This is the ninth book in the **Left Behind** series. Set in the not too distant future, the series, which is based on an interpretation of the Book of Revelation, follows the lives of Christian believers during the rise to world domination of the Antichrist. **Desecration** sees the Jews being led out of Jerusalem by a modern day Moses. All books in the series are complete in themselves, but if you wish to begin at the beginning, start with **Left Behind**. A tenth book in the series is due out later this year.

A Mad World, My Masters by John Simpson

This book by the BBC World News Correspondent is autobiographical, but not an autobiography. In it John Simpson describes just a few of his experiences and some of the people he has met through his work for the BBC. His experiences include meeting a young Osama bin Laden, being in Belgrade during NATO bombing, handling the forged Hitler diaries, visiting a cocaine market in Columbia, witnessing the handover of Hong Kong and watching the sun rise on Millennium Island in the South Pacific, the first place on earth to see the sun rise on January 1st 2000. John Simpson's writing is easy to read, informative and often amusing.

Catilina's Riddle by Steven Saylor

Ancient Rome was never like this, if you studied Latin at school in the days when the Ablative Absolute reigned supreme!! Steven Saylor in his Sub Rosa series of which **Catilina's Riddle** is just one, makes the world of Rome come alive in the days of the first century BC when men like Julius Caesar, Mark Anthony, Sulla, Pompey, Catilina and others were striving to seize supreme power over Rome and therefore over much of the then known world. **Catilina's Riddle** follows the rise and fall of Catilina (Catiline) whom history regards as the worst of rebels, but to whom Steven Saylor gives a much more human face.
