

Editor's Page



June 8th is Whit Sunday or Pentecost, the day recorded in Acts 2 when the Holy Spirit came upon all the apostles. Pentecost was the name of the Jewish festival celebrated 50 days after the Passover. It is a spring Harvest Festival when thanks are given for the first grains of the barley crop.

The word, Pentecost, comes from the Greek word πεντεκοντα (pentekonta) which means fifty, since there are fifty days or seven weeks between Easter and Whit Sunday and between the Jewish Passover and Pentecost. Whit Sunday itself means white Sunday and it was often the tradition to dress in white that day, especially for the Whit walks.

June 15th is Trinity Sunday, when we ponder on the meaning of the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

June 22nd is Deane Sermons. This year we are returning to an old tradition of holding a service in the churchyard, using the outdoor pulpit! The 10.30am service will be held outdoors (weather permitting) and will be followed by a picnic in the church grounds. If wet, the service will be in church and the picnic will be in the Memorial Hall. Please do come and do not forget to bring your lunch with you. You may also like to bring along a rug or a garden chair unless you like sitting on the ground!



Sermons are an old tradition in Bolton. Their exact origin is uncertain, but they probably were first held over 200 years ago and were a celebration for the Sunday School. In the early days of the industrial revolution and before universal education in 1870, the only way poor children learned the basics of reading, writing and arithmetic was on a Sunday when they attended Sunday School. Once a year these children, many of whom worked over 14 hours a day, six days a week in factories, were processed through the streets of the parish to church where they listened to a sermon (no doubt a long one!) telling them what fortunate children they were!

June 2nd is the 50th anniversary of the coronation of HM The Queen. We send our loyal greetings to Her Majesty and wish her long life, health and happiness. Do remember to look at the blue material on the panels on either side of the cloakroom and kitchen at the back of Church. This material was used in Westminster Abbey in June 1953 and pieces were given to parish churches all over the country after the coronation.



June 21st is the 21st birthday of HRH Prince William. Let us pray that he will be able to find a satisfying role for himself in the coming years and that he may have the opportunity to grow closer to God through the influence of Christian companions.

WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

Africa

ETHIOPIA/ERITREA The

world focus on Iraq could impact the amount of future relief committed here, with food pledges for Eritrea currently well below requirements. Pray for Tearfund partners in both countries as they develop their response, and for the church as it responds to great need.

ZIMBABWE The country desperately needs a return to accountable government and an end to violence and intimidation. Pray for Tearfund partners too as they help people living with famine and HIV/AIDS.

DRCONGO Rwandan and Ugandan troops are supporting different rebel groups in north-eastern areas, adding to the violence. Last month's massacre in Ituri province occurred just after the government and other groups signed a peace agreement. Pray that the settlement will end political and ethnic strife.

SUDAN Last month the President and the rebel leader John Garang met for only the second time in 20 years – and indicated they hoped for peace by June. Pray for positive progress as the peace talks continue.

Central Asia/Middle East

AFGHANISTAN Clashes have erupted in the north recently between supporters of rival warlords. Conflict is making it difficult to deliver aid to vulnerable communities. Pray for Tearfund's partners and Disaster Response Team, among those helping very needy people.

IRAQ Enormous challenges remain: pray that violence will end and be replaced by security and stability; pray that urgent humanitarian needs will be met speedily and effectively; pray for all responsible for the future government of Iraq and its reconstruction.

Asia

CHINA An estimated 1,280 cases of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) have been reported here. The Chinese government is now beginning to admit that the disease's spread needs to be halted urgently. Pray for those affected; 2,700 people are reportedly infected worldwide, and over 100 have died.

BANGLADESH Tearfund partner Heed reports that the Iraq crisis has seriously affected life in Bangladesh. Prices have already risen considerably, social unrest is more prevalent and religious violence is on the increase, particularly towards minorities including Christians. Pray that calm and restraint will prevail.

Latin America

ARGENTINA Even with a new president after elections last month, recovery is likely to be slow. The recent economic crisis has left many feeling pessimistic, with widespread distrust of politicians. Pray for a new start, stability and hope, and for Tearfund partners El Retono, Sacdem, Kairos, Ediciones Certeza and Asociana, helping those facing increasing poverty.

COLOMBIA Ongoing armed conflict between government forces, paramilitary and guerrilla groups is having an increasingly negative impact on whole communities. Many children who have fled their homes now have no access to formal education. Pray for all vulnerable people, and for those promoting peace and justice, including local churches and Tearfund partners.

Personal Memories of the Coronation The Editor writes:

"I was only four at the time of the coronation, but I remember the day clearly. It began with my father coming upstairs with the newspapers, one of which had the headline 'All This and Everest Too'. The news that a British team with Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing Norgay had reached the summit of the world's highest mountain, Everest, was only received in Britain that morning.

June 2nd was the day before my birthday and I received my birthday present early. It was a model of the coronation coach. These (according to the Antiques Road Show) are now quite valuable, but alas, I so enjoyed playing with my coronation coach that it disintegrated long ago!

Like most families in Bolton in 1953 we had no television. However I was lucky. We had just moved to Bolton from Salford and my grandmother back in Salford got an invitation for us to watch the ceremony on a screen set up in the church hall there. Small children were not supposed to attend, but I had acquired the reputation of being a nice well-behaved little girl and so I was allowed to watch with my mother and grandmother. My father pushed my two younger sisters, one only six weeks old, around the grounds in the pram and sometimes peeped in to watch the ceremony.

I remember thinking to myself as the Archbishop of Canterbury raised the crown over the Queen's head and crowned her that this was a most important moment which I must remember all my life! And I still do!

Twelve months later the Queen visited Bolton on her coronation tour. By then I was at school. However my class was not old enough to stand on the steps of the Town Hall with all the other children of Bolton. Instead my parents took us all into town. My father found us a place outside Marks and Spencer on Deansgate where the Queen was to drive by. In those days Deansgate was a busy two way street, not the pedestrian precinct it is today. The Queen passed by and I saw a green hat and not much else.



I have had much better views of the Queen over the years and indeed once attended a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace, but it was not until last year that the Queen actually spoke to me. She thanked me for the flowers which my 8 year old niece had just handed to her during a walkabout in Beverley in Yorkshire. Her words were "Thank you. You are very kind" - another thing which I will remember all my life!"
