

What's the point of Christmas?


Bert kicked out at a divot in frustration as we strolled to the 7th tee. 'It's mid-November and I'm fed up with Christmas. Sorry to sound like Scrooge, but what's the point of it all?' I thought for a moment. 'If you had to choose an object which best sums up Christmas for you Bert, what would you go for?'

'An object?' he said as he settled over the tee. 'Oh I don't know. Probably a potato — given how much time I spend sitting in front of the box. Then again perhaps the good old Christmas tree gets to the heart of it. Trees, cards, Father Christmas — its just a rag bag of 19th century traditions. If it wasn't for Victoria marrying that Albert chap I wouldn't be picking up pine-needles out of my feet every year. If it was up to me I'd take a 3-iron to Christmas' — there was a swish as Bert swung through the ball — 'and drive it into the blue yonder.' He winced as the white dot drifted over towards the rough. 'How about you? What would be your object?'

'Well, I can relate to what you're saying. The reason for the season does seem to have got lost in the rough. It's become a bit like playing golf on a course with no greens and no holes. WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

Asia

PAKISTAN Tearfund partner Centre for Legal Aid, Assistance and Settlement are campaigning to make Christians and other religious minorities exempt from Islamic sharia law. As they lobby for Christian and non-Muslim court cases to be tried under Pakistan's penal code, pray for them and for those facing harsh sentences.

SRI LANKA Organised attacks against Christians by Buddhist extremists are becoming more widespread. Pray for protection and discernment for Tearfund partner the National Christian Evangelical Alliance of Sri Lanka, and for those in Christian ministry whose lives, homes and churches are vulnerable at present.

Africa

ERITREA All evangelical churches have been closed. Members can no longer meet openly, yet the government encourages their relief and development work, including that of Tearfund partners, because of their proven experience. Pray for prejudice and fear to be broken down to bring both material and spiritual renewal.

NIGERIA Give thanks that this year's elections have brought some stability. Pray against violence between Christians and Muslims in the north that has claimed many lives, and for Tearfund partners FCS and Rurcon.

DRCONGO More UN peacemakers are being deployed in the Ituri province after 65 people were killed by ethnic militias in Kachele last month. Pray that greater security in all areas can cement the peace process, and for Tearfund partners and teams working to bring relief and reconciliation in some of the most needy places.

SUDAN Peace talks between the government and rebels made positive progress last month; once wealth and power-sharing issues are resolved, a final settlement may come soon. Pray that a just agreement brings lasting hope.

Latin America

HONDURAS In 1998, 600,000 Hondurans were evacuated after Hurricane Mitch; its impact was increased by poverty, and western practices of overexploitation. As Tearfund launches its Whose Earth? campaign, pray for the wealthy to influence governments, and choose lifestyles that benefit all people and the planet.

BRAZIL Corruption in high places affects the poorest communities - many are without basic health services, such as access to fresh water and free health care. Pray for Tearfund partners including Acao Evangelica, who face fresh threats of violence after a private clinic owner tried to halt their use of a free eye testing service.

Central Asia/Middle East

TURKMENISTAN This increasingly isolated country in Central Asia is effectively a one-party state with no independent media. Christians and other

minorities face threats, harassment and persecution. Pray for those working discreetly for change and hope.

ISRAEL/PALESTINE After the suicide bombing in Haifa which killed 20 people, the Israeli military ordered the expulsion of 15 Palestinian detainees from the West Bank. Pray for justice to be upheld, and for violence and retaliation to end.
