The Rector Writes Putting the 'fun' back in dysfunctional

It's a bit of a strange title isn't it for this months article. I have to say that it is not original. Someone I heard about had a fridge magnet which she had put on display for her family. It read: "Let's put the 'fun' back in dysfunctional."

Now this particular woman knew something about this topic. She was separated from her husband and the children where being shuttled between them on a regular basis, so I guess that if anybody knew what being dysfunctional was it was her.

Well, what could possibly be fun about her situation? Not much I suppose, but I hope that she could find *something*, because it would be truly awful to be so enslaved by your circumstances that it is impossible to find *any* "fun" in your "dysfunction."

Let me be honest with you - I'm not finding it a particularly "fun" time in my ministry at this particular moment. As many of you will know it has been a particularly difficult time in the church with both bereavements and sickness. At times I feel weighed down by other people's loss and at times their sense of hopelessness. I empathise with how they must be feeling and my heart aches for them. And then there are those who seem to do nothing but gripe about things in the church. The only time they want to have a "quick word with you" is when they want to voice a complaint of one sort or another. And to be honest most of what they want a "quick word" about is, in my opinion, trivia. And it's not just me! I know others feel themselves afflicted in such a way. Oh how one longs that such people would be a positive force within the church rather than a negative one. That they will seek to build up rather than to pull down. That they will realise that their actions and attitudes aren't helpful, not only to the church and others, but to themselves as well. But hey, less of me, what about some of you? I guess that some of you woke up this morning feeling depressed about one thing or another. That some of you come to church on a

Sunday morning with a smile on your face but with an ache in your heart. And the point I really want to make here is this: if God can't meet us in the middle of whatever bad news we are in, then he can't meet most of us most of the time, and we are in big trouble.

So here is some "fun" you might want to put right in the middle of your "dysfunctional" life:

There is nothing too big for God to handle. (Matthew 19:26) There is nothing too bad for him to forgive. (1 John 1:9)

The forces that threaten to steal your life and your future are puny compared to his awesome power. (Romans 8:38-39)

He could change your fortunes in a day if he wanted to. (Daniel 2:21)

If he doesn't, there's a good reason why. (Proverbs 16:9)

He not only loves you, he is delighted with you despite all your dysfunctions, and revels in every moment you spend with him. (Song of Solomon 2:10-13)

He knows your sorrow. He remembers that you are dust, and collects all your tears in a bottle. (Psalm 103:14; Psalm 56:8)

He will give you strength and courage for whatever you may yet have to go through. (Romans 8:31)

Someday, from your mansion in heaven, you will look back on this day and smile, because you will realize that your light and momentary troubles were achieving for you an eternal glory that far outweighs them all in comparison. (2 Corinthians 4:17-18)

There. Think you can manage a smile now? This "fun" stuff isn't just wishful thinking. It is real, and it exists in spite of everything around us. Kind of like the "fun" in dysfunctional that I bet you didn't even know was there until now.

So when things feel as if they are overwhelming us then let us get out this article again and let Gods words above give us both strength and comfort.

Traidcraft collects top social reporting award




Christian-based Traidcraft's approach to social reporting has earned top honours in the prestigious 2005 ACCA UK Sustainability Awards.

Special days in May

25 Ascension Day - Forty Days with the Risen Christ

May continues the season of Eastertide, and 40 days after

Easter comes Ascension Day.

It may seem crazy to call it Eastertide when Easter is clearly over! - but these are the forty days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to his disciples, following

his death and resurrection.

The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those forty days. Jesus was seen by numerous disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged his disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent him, he was now going to send them - to all corners of the earth, as his witnesses.

Editor: if you want to add more detail to Christ's appearances, the stories can be found in Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; and John 20.

31 The Blessed Virgin Mary

Mary - the virgin mother of Jesus. For centuries the eastern and western churches have considered her pre-eminent among all the saints.

In the gospels, Mary makes her first appearance as a teenager. Nothing is known of her childhood, and what we do know of her is found mostly in Matthew 1 - 2 and in Luke 1 - 2. If you read both accounts, you'll notice that Luke's account seems to give the story from Mary's standpoint, whereas Matthew concentrates more on Joseph's side of things. In both accounts the virginal conception of Christ is clearly stated. Mary's quiet devotion to God and her acceptance of his will shine forth.

After Jesus is born, Mary fades into the background, and makes few appearances: when the family visits Jerusalem and she loses her son on the way home; when she urges him to help the wedding party in Cana with its wine problem; and when Jesus gives her into the keeping of the beloved disciple when he is dying on the cross.

Mary obviously joined the early Church, but her role was never one of teaching and preaching, and indeed she remained so much in the background that nothing more about her is known

for certain.

Heading for Madagascar!

I am writing to tell you about a new project I am starting and to ask you for your prayers, your support and your blessing for this new venture.

I have applied to Tearfund, the Christian relief and development charity, and been accepted to serve as a volunteer on a four week project in Mandritsara in North-East Madagascar, working on the Transform Project.

The Transform programme enables Christians to spend from two weeks to four months working hand in hand with Tearfund's local partners in Africa, Asia and Central and South America. Transform teams turn their hands to a wide range of work, from building houses for widows and orphans from Rwanda's genocide, to working with children orphaned by AIDS in Thailand and working with street children in Brazil.

My journey starts on 8th July, and on my arrival in Madagascar I will be helping to build a guesthouse, helping with the local vaccination programme, arranging sports competitions to spread the awareness of HIV/AIDS and running a kids' summer club at the local church in Mandritsara. I'll be joined by ten other volunteers from around the country as part of the Transform team.

As many of you will know, I am a second year music student at the University of York, and I've never done anything like this before. I know that although my journey to Mandritsara will be exciting, it will also be incredibly tough. We shall be living in homes where there is no electricity, no running water or flushing toilets. Madagascar is one of the poorest countries in the world and 70% of the people there live below the poverty line.

We will be living with local families in their homes, and working with the local people, which gives me an amazing opportunity to make friendships and learn about a culture which is completely different to our own. For me, this will be a once in a lifetime, life-changing experience. I feel so fortunate to have been selected to be able to take

part in this project. I really want to go out there in July and actually be able to make a difference, and even if I only help a few people out of thousands, then I will have done something worthwhile.

The trip will cost in the region of £2,000 and I am in the midst of dreaming up many crazy fund-raising ideas. However, as well as your prayers and your blessing, I would greatly appreciate any donations or sponsorship you may care to make, however little. 
