The Rector Writes

What are you growing?

Do you ever listen to Gardeners Question Time on BBC Radio Four? I occasionally listen in, to see what I should be doing this week, to discover what is the best hedge to plant in a windy position, to discover what that bug is that is eating through pear leaf. One of the people I like listening to is Bob Flowerdew (What a delightful name for a gardener). Now Bob is, I am reliably informed, Britain's leading organic farmer. But not only is Bob and organic farmer he is obviously one of those who does not want to see anything go to waste so everything is recycled. And its amazing what he does recycle! I sometimes wish that I could see his garden not so much to look at his plants but to see what has been used how! Of course bob is not really interested in the ornamental garden, for Bob everything that is grown has one purpose only to be eaten. So Bob is really into helping people grow their own.

You each one of us, whether we are interested in growing vegetables or not, should be interested in growing at least one thing, and that is your soul. You see your soul is very important. Your soul is the place where you know there is a God even before you meet Him. The soul is that in us which longs for the right thing. And once we come into a relationship with God it's the place where we commune with Him. The soul can be filled with God or devoid of Him, but if it is empty God is the only thing that will fill it. We can grow all sorts of pleasures and loves in there, but none will satisfy like God, because the soul was made to long for Him and no other. When God breathed into Adam he became a living soul, forever longing for Gods breath to fill him again.

So growing your soul means to enlarge your capacity for God and truth. Its all about learning to walk with God - listening to Him through His word and through the natural revelations of Him that come through the things He has made, which includes all the people you know since they were made in Gods image. Growing your soul can also involve finding God in the ordinary life and activities we share every day. Its about being more conscious of the presence of God within you as you go about your normal routines of life. Growing your soul doesn't only happen through spiritual activities like praying and reading the Bible; it can also happen in the way we do everything else. It's a God-consciousness that enlarges as we grow it. When Paul says that we are to pray without ceasing, he means that we are to be more soul-conscious.

This may be hard sometimes, even for the most mature of believers. We all go through times when everything around us seems dry and barren spiritually. Our souls though still long for God. David's soul longed for God in a dry and weary land where there was no water (Psalm 63:1), and like a deer panting for water his soul panted for the Lord (Psalm 42:1).

This is important to know, because it is not a longing that is over once we meet God. we still long for Him because we long to know Him more, and we sometimes loose sight of Him even though we know better. Just as we must regularly take in physical food in order to stay alive, our souls must have spiritual food in order to grow and be healthy.



Graduation?

There were so many graduates waiting to receive their degrees that day, that speed was of the essence. Presenting their diplomas, therefore, the Chancellor simply smiled and said: "Congratulations, keep moving."

It's actually good advice for all of life, and for your Christian life as well.

If you've discovered the reality of God's love for yourself, you deserve congratulations, for in a very real sense, you have arrived...but keep moving! - there is so much more that God has in store for you! Paul in 2 Timothy says "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day...."

So, wherever you have reached in your own faith pilgrimage, congratulations, but keep moving!

3 July St Thomas the Apostle

Thomas, one of Jesus' 12 apostles, was an impulsive, confused, honest sceptic. Jesus could understand and work with such a man.

Thomas' impulsiveness was evident when Jesus prepared to visit Lazarus in Bethany. It was a dangerous trip to make, because of the Jews, but Thomas urged his fellow disciples: "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (Jn 11.16) Instead, Jesus brought Lazarus back to life.

Thomas' confusion is shown in later talks with Jesus. He was not really sure where Jesus was going long-term (Jn 14.5). But Jesus accepted this confused commitment, and began to untangle it, patiently explaining "I am going to my father", and "No one comes unto the Father but by me." Finally, Thomas' honest scepticism is revealed after the Resurrection, which he flatly refused to believe - unless he could touch the wounds of the risen Jesus. Sure enough, Jesus appears - but instead of scolding him, shows him the wounds. Thomas responds: "My Lord and my God" (Jn 20.26ff).

Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of men and women across the centuries, who also want to follow Jesus, but who require some proof of this amazing event - the Resurrection. In Doubting Thomas' complete affirmation of faith, after meeting the risen, crucified Christ, they can find support for their own faith.

It is believed that he was martyred by a spear on 3 July, 72 AD in Mylapore, near Madras. 46 ancient churches in England were dedicated to him.

15 July St Swithun - saint for a rainy day

St Swithun is apparently the saint to blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15 July, it will then rain for forty days after that. It all began when he was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door. If he has been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun.

Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation, and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.

Pioneering research uncovers young peoples' views - and sets a challenge for today's church

A revealing new book looks set to be a page-turner for all those with an interest in how the Church engages with young people. 'Making Sense of Generation Y' contains the results of ground-breaking research into the world view of 15-25 year-olds who have little or no connection with the Christian faith, based on interviews with 120 young people in 18 locations across the country.

The book's researchers - academics Sylvia Collins-Mayo and Sara Savage, and youth ministry specialist Bob Mayo - embarked on an eye-opening journey that lays bare the dominant aspirations of contemporary youth.

The fourth author, the Rt Revd Graham Cray, Bishop of Maidstone and Chair of the Mission-shaped Church working party, offers reflections on the research's wide-ranging implications for the way that the Church relates to young people, placing the emphasis both on individual Christians and church groups to embody the gospel through an 'incarnational' approach - meeting and serving young people in their own environment.

Christian activity holidays for young people have a major spiritual impact

That is according to newly-published results from Christian Research. Nearly 800 young people were surveyed before and after a sample of 65 holidays which took place last summer. On almost every measure, their faith and practice grew significantly as a result of the holidays: they read the Bible more, their self-esteem improved, and they had greater belief in doctrines such as life after death. One in eight, 12%, had found faith on a Christian activity holiday.

Those who gained the most spiritually were the children of Christian parents in their early teenage years with little or no personal faith. The study found that holiday leaders were key to the spiritual impact of the events, and that most young people needed to come back several times to gain the full benefit. The survey was sponsored by a consortium of providers of Christian holidays. A parallel survey was also conducted of children attending Christian activity centres during term-time with their schools.




To the divine tutor




Invisible
