The Rector Writes

Radiant certainty in difficult situations



I opened the curtains a little and looked out of the bedroom window to see what the weather was like, and guess what? Yes you got it in one, it was raining, again. My heart sank. Yet another dismal day. I'm convinced I'm one of those who suffer from SAD (Seasonal Affective Disorder). I'm one of those folk who needs to see, at least occasionally, that there is a blue sky up there above the grey cloud. And if I don't see blue sky for days on end I get down, at times really down.

Unfortunately the particular day in question when I peeped out through the bedroom curtains was a Sunday. You know, my one day of work. And I began to think to myself, I'd rather stay at home today and not bother going to church. You see it wasn't meeting up with people that was putting me off. Nor was it the thought of taking the services and preaching. It was the thought of worshipping. How was I going to be able to worship when I felt as I did?

Let me honest with you (after all, honesty is the best policy), there are some days when frankly I don't feel like worshipping God. And there are probably more days like that than I care to admit.

Some of those days are brought on by the short days of winter, but usually they happen on the days when I am staring at my circumstances and making faithless judgements about what I see around me. And I struggle with the truth, the God given truth, that God is in the circumstances surrounding my life - all the circumstances surrounding my life.

I wonder, have you ever considered that heartbreak can be part of God's "plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (Jeremiah 29:11)? I mention this because I think at times we put so much of ourselves into avoiding hurt when in point of fact God would

have us embrace it. God wants us to know that he can heal our hurts and even use them for his benefit. He wants us to faithfully believe that the circumstances we think are harming us are actually positive situations that God is engineering.

God, who is omnipotent (all-powerful), sees the breadth and depth of our circumstances, and he knows his plans for our lives. Thinking then, like Christ, we can slowly — perhaps ever so slowly — begin to understand that avoiding the pain in our lives is actually an act of faithlessness. God calls us to faith in him during difficult circumstances. We on the other hand would rather place our faith in avoiding the circumstances.


As always Jesus shows us the way — because he is the Way. Jesus embraced the pain of God's plan for his life, and he did it with full faith that God was still working the plan to bring a "hope and a future" to your life and mine. Christ was so sure his grief would turn to joy that he showed a radiant certainty in God's faithfulness ("radiant certainty" is a phrase William Barclay uses to describe the attitude of Jesus at the Last Supper).

Jesus was heading into a crisis that would cost him his life, yet he was so certain — radiantly certain — of God's faithfulness that not one of his disciples even discerned the gravity of the crisis! Jesus was so certain of

God's faithfulness that it radiated throughout his whole being.

And we also can have this radiant certainty, this certainty that God's hand is on our lives. We can say, when it comes to God's faithfulness, "I know because I know that I know." That's radiant certainty! The cross was Christ's glory, not only his penalty—and the same is true of difficult circumstances in our lives.

So where does this take us? Let me suggest four thing:-



- We will develop a radiant certainty in God when we learn to trust in his faithful character. Our daily worship of God is irrevocably tied to our faith in God.
- We must choose to praise and worship God every day, no matter what the circumstances of our lives. Developing a radiant certainty in God begins with simple steps of faith and obedience.
- When faced with painful or difficult circumstances we need to ask God, "How do you want me to respond to this?" we need to make sure that we do not fall into the "Why me?" trap.
- We need to accept, as difficult as it is to do so, the fact that difficult circumstances are opportunities for us to intentionally focus our faith in God and see what he will do to give us hope and blessing.

Lent is early this year - because Easter is.

It seems strange to be nearly into Lent so soon after Christmas! Western Christians (i.e. in simple terms, not the Orthodox Church) celebrate Easter on the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or next after the vernal equinox* (autumnal equinox in the southern hemisphere) on March 21st. This year there is a full moon on March 21st so Easter is as early as it can be! The last time Easter was so early was in 1913 and the next time will be later than 2124, which is as far as the tables I've found go! Are you with me so far? Don't worry if you're not. It's all based on the date of Passover which is based on the Jewish calendar, which is lunar.

The real point for us here is that the start of Lent is based on working back from the date of Easter 40 days, plus Sundays. Yes, it's 40 days plus Sundays, because every Sunday always commemorates the Resurrection. If you're fasting for Lent, some would say, you have no need to do so on Sundays! They don't count—a little known fact. In some traditions Saturday is not included in the fast either because that is regarded as the Sabbath. So where does that leave those who are giving up chocolate (or anything else) for Lent? With their own consciences, I suppose!

Lent is a season of soul-searching and repentance. It is a season for reflection and taking stock. Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and when converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism. By observing the forty days of Lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days. All churches that have a continuous history extending before AD 1500 observe Lent. The ancient church that wrote, collected, canonized, and propagated the New Testament also observed Lent, believing it to be a commandment from the apostles.

So, each of us has a decision to make. Do we dismiss the whole idea as having no relevance in today's world, or do we find some way of moving closer to God at this time, which is the whole point? We each need to find our own way of doing this but if it doesn't involve some form of discipline it misses the point. It's not that we're setting about trying to deserve anything from God. It's a matter of growth and that almost always involves discipline. It doesn't happen automatically. So it could be a matter of asking ourselves how serious we are about growth in likeness to Christ.

^{*} The equinoxes are the two days in the year on which the sun is directly overhead at noon on the equator and day and night are of equal length everywhere on Earth.

Body Beautiful examines the Bible's teaching about the church and how it is to function in the world. The chapters are based on how a gathering of people (what we would call a church) can operate effectively to grow believers in their faith and knowledge of God, to encourage support within the church as its members get to know one another and serve one another and how to be effective Christians (with the support of the church) within the world. The chapters are based on eleven sermons preached by Melvin Tinker and Nathan Buttery at their church in Hull. It is very readable and extremely helpful especially for Christians who want know what God's design is for the group of people who meet Sunday by Sunday at St Mary's, Deane.
